Dear Parents/Carers and Students,

I hope that term 5 has started strongly for all our students this week; for many, Wednesday's celebration of Eid was a wonderful and enjoyable community occasion.

The School received some good news over the break: our Condition Improvement Fund (CIF) bid for the upgrade and renovation of the main school hall was successful, with the central government granting the School nearly £500,000 to enable us to carry out the necessary work on that important area of the School. The main school hall is used for many activities: assemblies; exams of course, musical concerts and plays; careers activities, talks and other gatherings. The state of the hall is such that we have already had to close the stage area. The monies will be used to carry out a full repair of the external roof, to install new lighting and to replace internal ceilings; to undertake a complete redecoration of that space and we also hope to be able to update the stage sound and lighting systems as well. The work will commence following the end of the summer public exam season in early July and is aimed to be completed by November.

This week, year 10 students have commenced their internal examinations in the hall; an opportunity for them to experience what their actual GCSE exams will be like next year, and an opportunity to demonstrate their progress to date in their academic courses; I do hope that those exams are progressing well for year 10 students. Years 11 and 13 are of course working hard as they prepare for their public exams, which commence in May, with our other year groups also continuing with important academic work, whether that is students in year 9 preparing for the GCSE RS short course, or students in year 7 continuing with their first year studies and preparing for their in class end of year assessments, which start on the 13th of May.

I was delighted to learn from Mr Croft, that our two flying start challenge teams, performed brilliantly in this week's regional finals, with our teams coming first and third respectively. Well done indeed to all those involved in that engineering project.

As our students will know, two of our teachers will soon be departing on their maternity leave: Mrs Hayes (History and head of year 12), and Mrs Humphreys (maths). We wish them well as they look forward, together with their families, to welcoming new life into our world, and we look forward to hearing of their good news in due course. Their work and roles in school will be covered internally: Dr Lintott will take over from Mrs Humphreys as second in mathematics, and Miss Parkin will be our new head of year 12 from the beginning









of June; Mr Bevan (head of year 13) will take over the leadership of the current year 12 cohort, when his year 13 group go on study leave in early May. Miss Parkin's work in term 6 will focus on the preparation needed to ensure the smooth induction into the sixth form of our new year 12 cohort. Joining the School in June will be a new drama teacher, Mrs Crozier, who will work closely with head of department, Mr Roberts, to further strengthen our creative arts offer to our students. Mr Passmore, who has been acting head of biology this year, will become our permanent head of biology with immediate effect; congratulations to him on his appointment, which reflects his outstanding leadership of the biology department across this academic year.

As you know, from my earlier letter today, our outstanding Ofsted report was officially released today - it makes for really wonderful reading.

My continued best wishes to you all.



There is also another training day on 21st April for the Y10s to do a Paddle sport Start canoe course or a Navigation course if they are walking and finalise their menus. Their practice expedition is the weekend after (26th-28th April) so they don't have time to forget it all!

Details for those will be sent out via ParentPay this week once we have confirmed the location (flooded rivers causing a few hiccups at the moment!).

The Y9s will be using their lunchtime DofE club sessions to ensure they can read a map, use a compass, have planned suitable menus and know what kit to take before their practice expedition on the 18th-19th May.
